William G. Durden, president of Dickinson College since 1999, was a member of the German Department at the Johns Hopkins University and Executive Director of the Center for Talented Youth (CTY).



James B. Comey served as Deputy Attorney General of the United States from 2003 to 2005, when he joined Lockheed Martin as a senior vice president and general counsel.



Robert A. Kennedy, president of the University of Maine since 2005, served for eight years as vice president for research and associate provost for graduate studies Texas A&M.



Admiral Gregory Johnson assumed duties as commander of U.S. Naval Forces in Europe and commander in chief of Allied Forces in Southern Europe in 2001. He retired from active duty in 2004.



Mark D. Gearan, president of Hobart and William Smith Colleges since 1999, served as director of the Peace Corps in Washington, D.C. and worked at the White House as Deputy Chief of Staff.



John E. Jones III is the U.S. District Judge of the Middle District of Pennsylvania. In 2005, he presided over the landmark case of Kitzmiller v. Dover School District, concerning the constitutionality of teaching intelligent design within a public school.

Susan J. Hunter began her career at the University of Maine in 1991 and is the vice president for academic affairs and provost, a position she has held since May




